## **1. Recipients of Awards for the Year 2008-2009 (with briefs about their initiatives) presented on 21st April, 2010**

### **1.1 Individual Category**

#### **1.1.1 Initiative - Removal of Encroachments of Structures - Maintaining Communal Harmony, Jabalpur, Madhya Pradesh<sup>1</sup>**

**Name of the recipient of the Award** - Shri Sanjay Dubey, IAS, then Collector & District Magistrate, Jabalpur Madhya Pradesh

**A brief about the Initiative** - Removal of encroachments of religious nature on public roads and lands without hurting religious sentiments of people is a very tough task. An anti-encroachment drive was undertaken in the Jabalpur district in 2005, by Shri Sanjay Dubey then Collector & District Magistrate, Jabalpur. Under this initiative, several rounds of meetings of the peace committee were held to decide the modalities of removal of religious structures. The members of the peace committee were taken into confidence and their cooperation solicited in the implementation of the orders of the High Court.

Shri Sanjay Dubey also called on the religious gurus and opinion makers, both collectively and individually, and explained to them the cause and commitment. Though the different interest groups feared to show their commitment in the open, they were aware of the cause and were supportive of it. It was the nominee's ability that enlisted the participation of the communities.

Out of 566 illegal structures of religious nature, 311 of different religious faiths were demolished / relocated during September 2005 to June 2008, without hurting the religious sentiments of the people or disrupting communal harmony. This brought down the number of road accidents and facilitated the development works under the JNNURM and other similar schemes. Citizens are now taking active part in preventing fresh encroachments.

#### **1.1.2 Initiative - Involvement of Community in Naxalite-affected Areas, Balaghat, Madhya Pradesh<sup>2</sup>**

**Name of the recipient of the Award** - Shri Gulshan Bamra, IAS, then Collector and District Magistrate, Balaghat, Madhya Pradesh.

**A brief about the Initiative** - Balaghat is one of the naxal-affected districts of MP and has been characterized by lack of employment opportunities. The district administration sought to implement the National Rural Employment Guarantee Scheme (NREGS) in 2006 through citizen-centric governance, participatory approach to development planning and addressing issues like wage employment, agricultural productivity and livelihood opportunities.

Shri Gulshan Bamra who took charge of the district with a population of 1.5 million in 2006, made it a priority to bring about a proactive administration that focused on people-centric governance, integrated implementation of government sponsored schemes like NREGS, sensitive policing, etc. While NREGS was implemented across the country, in Balaghat, the nominee integrated the use of development money under Central schemes such as road building, the state government's watershed programme and yearly plan funds, along with the projects taken up under NREGS. Since the development programmes were devised according to the local demand and monitored from the Panchayat level onwards, stakeholders' participation was ensured. Complaint boxes were provided and complaint registers were maintained at workplaces for quick disposal of complaints.

In three years, the road connectivity in the district increased to 2,228 kilometres from 520 kilometres. About 28,000 hectares of new land came under irrigation. Activities such as Tendu leaf collection and bamboo cutting were resumed. Revenues from forest produce nearly doubled from Rs. 28 crores in 2006-07 to Rs. 55 crores in 2008-09. Migration dropped from 4,217 in 2005-06 to 2,840 in 2008-09 as locals found work near their homes. It was a people-centric programme where all issues of local and social interests were discussed with the active participation of male and female members and decisions were taken in a democratic manner. Thus, the nominee was able to wean away the local community from the naxal influence and to ensure all-round development.

### **1.1.3 Initiative - Making Medicines Affordable, Chittorgarh, Rajasthan**

**Name of the recipient of the Award** - Dr. Samit Sharma, IAS, then District Magistrate, Chittorgarh, Rajasthan

**A brief about the Initiative** - The project was initiated to bring down the cost of the generic medicines in remote rural villages. Making quality drugs available at Government Cooperative Medical shops - at less than one fourth the price at which they are sold in private medical shops - has revolutionized the way drugs and other surgical instruments are procured, disbursed and sold in the rural areas within the state of Rajasthan.

The highlight of implementation was ensuring accessibility of drugs, through district wide chain of fair price medicine shops, which serve the OPD and 'Indoor patients' of Government Hospitals, and general public as well. The initiative included persuasion of doctors to prescribe generic medicines. Procurement of these generic medicines was done as advised by a team of doctors and certain very prestigious pharmaceutical companies were empanelled as drug procurement partners. Medicines thus obtained were dispensed, through government- controlled medical stores, at prices much below MRP (at one fourth price) and yet making 20% profit, thus making the initiative self- sustainable. The initiative mirrors Dr. Samit Sharma's ability to innovate, his leadership qualities, his style of functioning as a team player, and above all his commitment to reach out to the poor. As the District Magistrate of Chittorgarh, he created a synergy between the Government doctors, the machinery in the Health Department, Cooperative Department, District Administration and the Finance Dept.

The initiative reached out to the poor (BPL families), preventing them from falling into a debt trap on account of medical expenses. Affordability of medicines has helped them to willingly seek medical treatment. Approximately 5.1 lakh patients procured low-

cost drugs in Chittorgarh district. The initiative brought down the expenditure of state exchequer as the medicines provided free of cost were also procured at the generic drug prices. It also made 24X7 diagnostic test facility available in all Government hospitals at less than half the cost, enhancing the efficacy of health delivery system.

#### **1.1.4 Initiative - River Linking Project, Jalgaon, Maharashtra**

**Name of the recipient of the Award** - Shri Vijay Singhal, IAS, then Collector and District Magistrate, Jalgaon, Maharashtra

**About the Initiative** - In 2005, Jalgaon district received scant rainfall while most of Maharashtra was experiencing flood-like situation. All water reservoirs were empty and ground water level was depleting, while in the neighboring Nasik district, the Girna dam was overflowing. The Jalgaon district administration implemented an innovative river linking project to divert the excess water from the Girna dam to the water-scarce regions of Jalgaon. Cooperation and support were garnered from all the stakeholders to achieve a common objective, viz. tackling water scarcity and providing water for irrigation and other purposes. The landowners affected by the project became willing partners, as parting with a part of their land would allow the remaining part of the land to be arable on account of availability of water for irrigation.

Shri Vijay Singhal conceived the project and provided leadership in translating the concept into reality in a record time with full support from all stakeholders. He sought the support of the local communities and villagers in the form of 'Shramdaan' and was instrumental in marshalling the resources from the Irrigation Department, State Government and MP/MLA Local Area Development Scheme funds.

The initiative gainfully utilized the excess water from surplus regions in the water deficit regions. It, thus, solved the drinking water problem for a population of about 0.85 million in one municipal corporation, five municipal councils and 123 villages, thus, saving the money spent on supply of water by tankers. It resulted in additional storage capacity of 4,886 Mcft of water. Around 700 medium, small dams, village tanks and percolation tanks were filled and more than 16,000 water wells were recharged because of this river connectivity project. The irrigated area increased from 13,000 hectares in 2005 to 30,000 hectares in 2008.

#### **1.1.5 Initiative - Cervical Cancer Screening, Chennai, Tamil Nadu**

**Name of the recipient of the Award** - Shri Rajesh Lakhani, IAS, Commissioner, Corporation of Chennai, Tamil Nadu

**A brief about the Initiative** - Madras Cancer Registry reported an incidence of 1,90,000 cases of cancer in 2002. This was due to overwhelming epidemiological and social conditions prevalent in Chennai. Poor women in their income-earning years are at high risk as a result of low socioeconomic status, poor genital hygiene, early marriage, and lack of knowledge about the disease and treatment. A new program in the area of women's preventive health to detect pre-cancerous lesions in the cervix of women between 18 and 60 was launched by the Municipal Corporation, Chennai as in this disease, prognosis and timely treatment ensures 100% cure.

Shri Rajesh Lakhani identified a cost and time-effective (one visit) WHO-approved cryotherapy technology and applied it through the existing machinery, after additional training. Emphasis was laid on proactive outreach through Multi-Purpose Health Workers (MPHWs), who go into the community and mobilize beneficiaries to avail of screening and follow up test. Cryotherapy involves continuous monitoring of the patient and regular follow up over a period of 5 years. Treatment was given at the 9 zonal health centers, in a single visit. All 93 health-posts were equipped for detection.

The number of tests done in all medical college hospitals was only 1230 in the year 2007-08. However, through the project-initiative, coverage was extended to over 1 lakh poor and marginalized women. Against a total population of 18 lakh women, screening of 1, 73,689 women for cervical cancer was completed between April 2008 and November 2009. 1579 women were detected positive and, thus, saved as a result of early detection, treatment and continuous monitoring. The remaining population is being screened. The Government of Tamil Nadu is introducing this initiative all over the State.

**A brief about the initiative** - Food procurement and public distribution are two important pillars of food policy of Government of India, for protecting farmers and consumers interests. The State of Chhattisgarh (CG) procures over 30 Lakh Metric Tonnes of Paddy every year on Minimum Support Price (MSP) from more than 7.5 Lakh farmers over a period of about 3.5 months. As a part of this initiative, all processes involved in paddy procurement and PDS have been fully computerized involving different organizations like Department of Food, CG Marketing Federation, CG State Civil Supplies Corporation (CGSCSC), Food Corporation of India, and Central Cooperative Bank.

Web-based monitoring of transportation of PDS commodities at Chhattisgarh State Civil Supplies Corporation headquarters has been developed. In this, the GPS technology is used to monitor transportation of PDS commodities from warehouses to FPS. The movement of the truck is shown on a map as a moving icon in real time and can be monitored from the control room. If the truck goes to a geofenced area, SMS alarms are sent to the concerned authorities so that action can be taken. The system is a technological solution to check diversion of PDS commodities.

The complaints lodged through citizen interface website or call centre are monitored through a Complaint Monitoring System. Details of enquiry Officer, his report, and action taken by the centres are entered in the system by concerned authority.

The initiative by the team for up gradation of paddy procurement and Public Distribution System (PDS) helped to increase transparency, eliminate corruption and people's participation at all levels. Transparency is also ensured in maintaining Unified Ration Card Database and Issue of PDS commodities to FPS, which facilitated all the eligible households to utilise their right to have a ration card and also commodities available at their respective ration shop.

At a time when the effectiveness of public service delivery system is increasingly coming under scrutiny and Public Private Partnerships (PPPs) are being touted as the only option to improve service delivery, the team, through this initiative has established the continuing relevance of government institutions in reaching out to the rural poor.

**A brief about the Initiative** - The Scheduled Tribes and Other Traditional Forest Dwellers (Recognition of Forest Rights) Act 2006 was brought into effect on December 31, 2007. The initiative to implement the Act with the objective to ensure that the tribal and traditional forest-dwellers received the entitlement to forest resources, and were protected from exploitation by vested interests, was undertaken in January, 2008 in Madhya Pradesh.

The Tribal Welfare Department of the State Government, with the help of its Forest Department developed very detailed software called "Survey of Forest Dwellers" at the instance of the above team of officers. This software helps the 'Users' in entering the data of each beneficiary. The software also gives complete District wise/Block wise MIS information. All the above information is placed on a website to make the system transparent. The State Government used the personal digital assistant (PDA), Geographical Information System (GIS) and Global Positioning System (GPS) for digital geo-mapping of land holdings of the claimants. This facilitated the survey of tribal communities and the creation of a database at the district level, making the implementation very efficient and expeditious at a very low cost.

As on 31-3-2009, the State Government received 3,29,184 claim. It had disposed 13,060 claims and title deeds ready for distribution were 32,419. The manner, in which the Central Act was implemented, made it very cost-effective, saving substantial funds to the state government. The government's successful efforts to reach out to the illiterate tribal population in sensitizing and in intending to regularize forestland occupied by them are evidenced by large number of applications. Such large-scale implementation could be achieved without any complaints from any quarter.

### **1.2.3. Initiative - Integrated Taxpayer Data Management System (ITDMS), Central Board of Direct Taxes, Government of India**

**A brief about the Initiative** - This initiative involved intelligent use of the Information & Communication Technologies (ICT) to develop a software search engine (a profiling tool) called MIPPPRA – Multi-Iterative Phonetic Pattern Recognition Algorithm – for matching names and addresses, based on whatever (little) data is available. It converts information into actionable intelligence.

The tool is an effective and non-intrusive investigation mechanism. The power of the software lay in the creation of identifiable groups of transactions of same taxpayer. A complementary ETL tool (Extract, Transform and Load) was developed to handle all types of file/data structures. Search parameters were made customizable. It has a choice of range of years, value and volume of transactions, constitution of the entity etc. The team took the initiative of converting huge mass of data and information available in different databases into actionable intelligence. The novel, unique and innovative tool is conceptualized, designed, developed (with the help of an outside agency), implemented and is being maintained by the team.

The tool is able to quickly source information from across different databases and create an integrated profile of the entity. It is facilitating isolation of taxpayers and groups having abnormal and/or high volume and/or high value of transactions. Matching of the identified groups with the data of their actual tax payments is an intelligent control mechanism made possible by the tool. The tool successfully helps the department overcome the difficulty and drudgery involved in manual collection and analysis of data from different sources in different structures and formats.

## **1.3 Organisation Category**

### **1.3.1. Initiative - Project Arrow - Transforming India Post**

**Name of the Recipient Organization:** Department of Posts, Ministry of Communications and Information Technology, Government of India

**A brief about the Initiative** - 'Project Arrow' was launched in April 2008 as an innovative integrated approach to reforming India Post and enhancing the quality of services and improving peoples' experience of select post offices around the country. 50 post offices were selected during Phase-1, and 450 were covered in Phase-2 ending in December 2008. Phase-3 covering 500 post offices is in progress. Innovations include integrated approach to improving technology, processes, and aesthetics related to four areas: mail delivery, savings bank, remittances, and service levels through streamlining

and digitization of processes and monitoring and supervision systems that involve stakeholders. Innovations to improve the 'look and feel' of the post offices include inputs into human resources, branding, technology, and infrastructure.

The objective of this project was to provide all e-enabled services so that post offices become a 'Window to the World' for the *Aam Aadmi*. IT-enabled reliable tools are used to ensure that all postal operations are smoothly carried out and less time is consumed by back-end operations. Performance Dashboard, a web-based monitoring system based on Data Extraction Tool has been implemented. A Blue Book, which documented *What is to be done* was brought out wherein all the best practices were summarized. Monitoring performance against the Key Performance Indications (KPIs) is the key to the success of Project Arrow.

The Project Arrow experience is a working model for bringing an integrated improvement in the post office so that customers can feel the difference. External audit of 50 post offices chosen for pilot revealed 99% improvement in registered letter performance, 94- 100% for ordinary mail, 89-99% speed post, and 100% for money orders. Average customer satisfaction score was 9.52 on a scale of 10. Employee motivation scored at 5.8 on a 6-point scale. Delivery of money orders on the day of receipt and removal of bottlenecks of cash availability in sub- and branch post offices and infrastructure to expand services were the other highlights.
